583 - To a religious³

Betharram 6 January 1862

Dear and Venerated confrere

The superior of the house asked me to tell you.

1 that the fixed stipend for masses each day has been set by the Bishop and that it applies to all priests of the society and as a consequence all residences. However where someone asked for a mass for a special day, it is necessary to let him know the stipend is two francs. Nota Bene: in allowing them to give only 30 sous, his mass will be said in turn.

As every amount given without instructions for the number of masses will be two francs each. If one is sure the person intends to give 50 frank stipends because they've always done that sort of thing, then the number of masses is fixed at 30 sous, and these masses are said by yourself or others in turn, which must be made known to the faithful. The retreat began yesterday evening; pray and ask others to pray for us. My good wishes to M Castetnau, greetings to MM Cazdepats and Sagorre.

Everyone can understand this, even the faithful; and so they will understand the fairness of the stipend of 40 sous for masses on a special day, novenas etc, etc which one celebrates before the others.

It is quite understood that one she would not explain to the faithful the stipends of indeterminate sums of money since it is on the Bishop's authority that the tariff is fixed. For what end? All the more reason that these masses are said before those with stipends of 30 sous.

584 - To Victor Paradis

20 January 1862.

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Before replying to your letter, I must ask you, to reflect and to consult those in authority. Having said that we are decided that you must give up your work with the military and confine yourself to the orphanage, retreats in communities, associations, confraternities, etc... and if you can be of any help at Saint-Louis either for confessions or preaching.

This is now quite clear! Understand within these limits you will find you are able to exercise boundless charity. At the moment I will only be able to add work with the class of the poor, when it is possible and that when it will be asked for by those responsible.⁵ I think that from the moment it is not required and you must wait. All yours.

585 - To Jean Hayet

22 January 1862.

In spite of all the means used to discover whether the young Dartigues has the germs of vocation to the ecclesiastical state, we do not recognize any trace of it. On the contrary, after having considered it in full Council, it has been decided as a matter of conscience to ask him to return to his parents, so that they will be able to give him another direction suitable to their position. Could you inform them and make them understand that we will send him to them at the first opportunity. Be patient always!

586 - To Jean Hayet

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How it is necessary to correct disorders? - Qu'il soit auxiliaire... I have been witness of considerably more disorders, I used to be teacher, bursar and responsible unofficially and by request for the whole community.

I used to warn M Lassalle; if he put things right, all the better; if not, patience.

You have not been requested to govern M Minvielle as much as God and the Bishop to keep him straight. You have no responsibility for this..

On the other hand the superior tells me:

They say to me: "M Lassalle is an old man."

But as I had not been officially appointed and as I was the youngest, I used to warn, and then I kept calm and content.

587 - To a missionary⁸

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February 1862.

It's necessary to avoid too great a familiarity with laypeople, and especially not to be involved in criticising or supporting criticism in case you make the work of mission impossible and give the society a bad name. It's necessary to make this known frankly when there is need for it.

You must tell laypeople that through himself, his position, and his age, etc. he is in a position to appreciate more than others the true state of affairs, and know what he must do for the best; as a missionary, he must remain entirely outside these sort of things.

588 - To Angelin Minvielle, superior of the seminary of Oloron

February 1862.

I have seen with much satisfaction the concession to the minor seminary at Sainte Marie⁹. The college requires a legal head who used to run into difficulties if he was a named priest. Now you can act as a true superior, be able to oversee with firmness and particular sensitivity whether the bursar of the Bishop, conforms to his wishes which will always be the sole reason for the greater good of the establishment, of the individuals and things, and for the greater glory of God. This is true from experience as well as faith. The most important thing is to convince oneself of it. May all good spirits be convinced of this. All yours.

590 - To Didace Barbe, Superior of the College of St Joseph

4 February 1862.

*Sursum corda*¹⁰! Your letter reminds me of the passage from Psalm 65: *imposuisti homines*, etc...¹¹. 2000 years ago, it was always like that; that you feel the weight of this burden.

But the Prophet knew as we do, the means of bearing it corde magno et animo volenti¹² et hilariter¹³. Transivimus per ignem et eduxisiti nos in refrigerium¹⁴. What is to be done? Men are and always will be men, you need to draw the best you can from them.

Let us pray, trembling and carrying the weight of the day and the work with humility and with an entire abandonment to God, always being persuaded that it is he who governs us and guides all things and as a consequence nothing will be lacking to us; that his blessing will always accompany us. Go ahead as the good God wishes. I have received as you have guessed, with great pleasure the thousand francs that you sent me. It will not be long changing into wheat.

The good Lord manifestly blesses your work: five taking the exam, five passed which is very good! Tell these children how much I've been pleased by their application, their success, five presented, five admitted of their 320 *optime*¹⁵.

All that deserves a day off. All that supposes especially how much God wishes their well-being and spiritual progress. I like to think that through this report, they will give you even more satisfaction than they have already. At Oloron, thanks be to God, the epidemic has ended. M de Baillencourt is the same! M Bernede¹⁶ always the same.

Are you going to receive M Cazaubon? He really wants to come, he has learned that this was in the mind of the Bishop and he has accepted it with all his heart. It is good that these dispositions join with the rest. He understands and will understand even better what an assistant is, I have every reason to believe he will know how to be and show himself such. I await your response. You must have understood that he was presenting himself as an assistant for teaching, for our house.

15 February 1862.

Monseigneur,

I thank your Excellency all the new and the wise advice that you deigned to give me.

1. M Bourdila¹⁷ wrote to your Excellency to thank you for the help¹⁸ that you have the given him.

2. In my opinion, M Casau would be the most suitable to do prison Ministry at Oloron and stay with M Lassus. Your Excellency will decide about it.

3. I have learnt with great pleasure the concession to the minor seminary of Oloron¹⁹. Without speaking of other valuable advantages, it will bring to an end a legal superior²⁰ which proved divisive.

4. I have written to the superiors of the Daughters of the Cross about the bequest of Dogne and the authority that is required.

I send your Excellency the note which M Perguilhem gave me who presided at the missions in Montaut, Bordes or Angais. I will continue to repeat your wise and simple advice. I sincerely regret what has been said against this line of conduct, that our rules so strongly and frequently demand. I will make every effort to see that they are followed in the future.

592 - To Pierre Barbe, Superior of Moncade

Betharram, 18 February 1862.

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I have thought about your plan for M Dartigues. Firstly you do not need to go back to to what has been destroyed with so much violence, as incompatible with Moncade and the free school.

You say that the realisation of your plan wouldn't harm Moncade; that remains to be seen.

But would it be the same for the free school? You know what has happened already! You know what has been said about all the discussions inside and outside: that you did everything for those who paid and neglected those who didn't pay.

You must make sure that you do not let the same thing be said again. That is clear! What I think you can do, in my opinion, is to hold on to all the children and care for them equally as much as possible, outside meals and board. If you need more people and money, speak to the mayor for more help.

Once again, when will they understand that those who pay must be mentioned as paying, and those who do not, must be kept free not to pay. I'm saying to you that I can scarcely see your plan working! Recognize this! *Valete*.

593 - To Didace Barbe, Superior of the College of St Joseph

22 February 1862.

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1. I received your two letters, of 26th December and 2nd January. I was very pleased to know about the ordination of our members²¹. May they always be at the service of the Holy Spirit whom they have received by the imposition of the Bishop's hands.

2. Poor Lalanne!²² May he also be able to say a sincere mea culpa on this side of the grave.

3. As for M Casaubon. Patience! The initiative for my proposition comes from the Bishop himself. I didn't think of it! Once again be patient! And then whatever the good Lord wishes will happen.

4. I will deal with the dimissorial letters.

5. As for the exams, all is well: the good Lord is visibly protecting the College. I see what you have done for the College is very appropriate.

6. You will give the enclosed letter to M Larrouy from his brother.

7. Also a letter is enclosed for Brother Jean-Marie²³.

8. M de Bailliencourt is in the same condition, saying mass from some time to time. M Bernede has received extreme unction; he is very weak, worn out.

9. In regard to the political situation, we are no longer able to know anything; pray and wait for events. While we are waiting, Oloron has ceased to be a college so as to become a minor seminary. It's a very good thing.

10. The apparition of the Immaculate Conception in the grotto of Lourdes has been proclaimed by Monsignor Laurence who is going to build a beautiful chapel and consecrate the new pilgrimage²⁴. Seven of our members already been there, notably M Perguilhem with our little offering²⁵. It will be perhaps good if you could also send something to Mgr Laurence to help with the construction of the new chapel, with a letter to Mgr Laurence so that he may realise our joy in learning about this great and new blessing bestowed upon our Pyrenees.

I have learnt with much pleasure that you have been able to send dear M Harbustan²⁶ a companion for a short time. Would that I could send others! I do not know when I will have this pleasure!

Wishing that you be double your zeal, according to the needs to become true auxiliaries of the Sacred Heart.

594 - To Didace Barbe, Superior of the College of St Joseph

21 March 1862.

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1. I have taken note of the 182 masses that you have set aside for me.

2. I also made good use of the bill of exchange that you have sent me. Thank you very much!

3. Regarding Canon Pinero²⁷ it is for you to judge this business before God. I'd leave this matter entirety to your discretion.. You know that in these circumstances if prudence is necessary, it is also necessary to have well placed generosity.

4. I have sent by courier three dimissorial letters. They will complete what is missing; a dimissorial for M Cazaban²⁸, for his deaconate and dispensation from patrimonial title as they give here for MM Castainhs and Cazaban.

5. We are sorry to announce the death of M Bernede. Here we have said the Masses for our members that each of you will have to celebrate for him. We would like the prayers to be said by the brothers, that is five rosaries and five communions. Bernede died saint as he had lived.

6. I have learnt with much sorrow of M Harbustan's illness. You have done very well in leaving M Pommes²⁹ with him and recalling M Harbustan as soon as he is able to make the voyage without danger. But I add that, at the same time, it would be necessary to send

him to us, as his condition demands a long repose, everything leads us to wish that our members come here to convalesce in their native air, etc.... I hope that you will not lose sight of this recommendation both for yourself and for ourselves.

7. Today I return to Bayonne. His Excellency will consent to send M Irigaray³⁰ to Montevideo. But it is necessary for M Harbustan to be superior or better still that M Sardoy ³¹might replace him in this post, after having examined before God everything and being settled with the Bishop of Buenos Aires and the Vicar Apostolic of Montevideo. We intend to send a brother³² with M Irigaray whose sight is always weak but whose health has improved since his ministry at Sarrance where he is very appreciated and he is doing much good. We will decide about this business after your next letter.

8. Fr Ramiere³³ would like some useful and edifying information about your mission; on the state of the faith in those countries, on the good which is being done there, about the native people in the area, etc... see if you can do this yourself or by someone else who has time. e.g. for the Messenger of the Sacred Heart.

9. The parish priest of Argeles has died³⁴. He was an uncouth saint, much tried during his life.

Crescite in gratia et in cognitione domini nostri et salvatoris Jesu Christi.ipsi gloria et in diem aeternitatis. Amen³⁵. Pray also for our sick. M de Bailliencourt, Coumerilh for whom we do not see any immediate danger.

It has been noticed that you walked to Pontacq with M Lero⁴⁰, the enemy of the parish priest. On this occasion the rumour has been repeated ad nauseam that you have made remarks either at Pau or at Pontacq that leads them to understand that you will not stay in the society; more so that you have been irresponsible etc.. etc.

Say what I will that I believe nothing of it, this is not the first time that they have spoken about you in a similar way; and the fact is you have given that impression; it is obvious.

However you have whatever is necessary to be the joy and glory of the Society totiusque Ecclesiae⁴¹. I beg you, leave these impressions of camaraderie, of discontent,

which compromise the Society, yourself and your Ministry, and offend good sense and religion. Get rid of these nothings for ever which prevent you appearing as a reliable person, as you ought to be, and a man of God, *exemplum fidelium, in conversatione verbum sanum et irreprehensibile ut is ex adverso est vereatur, nihil habens malum dicere*

As for M Cazaubon it will be a great pleasure for him to go and see his sister at La Puye. Please let me know a convenient time for it. He is doing very well. It is quite annoying that the Bishop feels he cannot employ him in the this region. The previous business, the unfortunate affair of M Laplace⁴⁵ once more in prison, etc... unfortunately concurring make it impossible for him here.

I have really tried my best to employ him as a helper with M Barbe at Buenos Aires but this has fallen through, because of the strict regulations that the Bishop there takes

against foreign priests, against the admission of priests whose past has not been without reproach.

1 I shudder over the behaviour of M Hayet⁴⁷ which I can't account for. This is influenced of Satan's rage.

My wish before everything else is to have recourse to prayer. You have already received a 40 days prayer which I recommended all our members to say from a circular addressed to the superiors of all residences; that is to say I would like each member of the Society to say this prayer to Our Lord which you all received.

2. We would have been very happy to see you again here. We regret that a similar reason has prevented you giving us the pleasure and that advantage. Have patience! God doesn't wish it. Continue to do your duty in all simplicity, doing what you can to dissipate these black clouds and storms which our enemy doesn't cease to create. Go forward always!

3. I approve of your visit to Buzy⁴⁸ on this occasion.

4. I believe that M Florence unfortunately is still not able to take up his work for some time. So it will be necessary to find someone else for your retreat.

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602 - To Angelin Minvielle, Superior of the Seminary of Oloron

Towards the 30th of April 1862.

Without a doubt one always shudders when one witnesses similar scenes. But once you can say that you have honestly done everything you could to prevent it, be patient! Leave it in the hands of Providence and redouble zeal and courage in your work.

What has happened to M Hayet? He tells me that he has given his accounts to Monsignor and has made known the facts, which facts I do not know.

What I know is that he has made known things of no consequence which, from his sick mind, the devil has presented as being unbearable.

Once more, be patient and go-ahead! In a short time I will go to Bayonne and see what he has written and said.

603 - To the same person

9 May 1862.

Peace and happiness is very nice; but I fear that it may not be the peace of God, which alone is desirable, durable, eternal, good like charity; its first and most precious fruit, for which each of our members should ask of the Lord during these 40 days, for our poor community; peace within the sole good pleasure of God.

2. I am painfully shocked by the way our members are publicly showing intense dislike against a superior, whoever he may be, sent to them by authority. What will be the

outcome of this behaviour? It makes all religious societies impossible! For every religious society is a union of men governed by other men, who take the place of God, yet are always men with human weaknesses. Do we need to always be slow of heart to believe the will of God, where it is presented for us to embrace, and find in it our happiness? Do we need to look for a Seraphim instead of M Hayet? And those with this attitude, which I deplore, would find a Seraphim even more unbearable than M Hayet, because this Seraphim would be a friend of order, obedience, humility and charity, etc...etc.., and would not hesitate to upset those with this spirit, where nothing can bring satisfaction except when each does what he pleases.

In the presence of these claims which I regard as a plague in the community, this is what I see one should do. When one person-ally feels like this: 1 far from speaking about it, promptly drive it away with the same speed as you would impure temptations; 2 replace it with sentiments of humility and charity for others, as we admire in St Frances Xavier and to those I have drawn our members' attention in the circular you have received.

As for an assistant superior⁵¹, it is useless speaking about it, you have been charged to do everything. It is your business to man-age the children and our members, to foresee their needs, both spiritual and temporal by yourself and by the people given to you for it; to know what concerns the bursar of the Bishop and the bursar of Betharram.

In the case of disagreements between these two bursars and yourself, you must speak to someone in authority, and no one else must know about it. Having understood and followed this, you can only pray for God's blessing and the protection of those whom the good Lord has sent us, and who are fit to glorify him in practising this rule of common sense and faith, which I have traced here for you. Ignorance or omission of this rule can certainly lead to apostasy, etc... which changed the apostles of Jesus Christ into veritable ministers of Satan. Absit!

Read to M Carrerot⁵² what concerns him in this letter, and if you have difficulties write to me.

Let them speak to you for all their needs; as for the implementation, each will do what concerns him. I like to think that you will not have any trouble with M Carrerot; but you can always write to me and once again in case of disagreement write; and you must certainly not resort to serious measures over trifles. What makes people shrug their shoulders in pity; the bread is a little too fresh or less fresh, people are brusque or gracious which perplexes others, what does that show? Lack of humility, obedience, charity, faith.

Fight against it all! Oh! I hope you understand!

And then what will their parents, acquaintances and friend say? So whatever happens, being on the spot you will see better than I can see here what God's designs are for these young men. I leave it in your hands entirely having carefully thought about it . So what you do, will be well done.

2. We have lost Brother Hippolyte from typhoid; it was a matter of four days. We are celebrating the masses as required for us and you.

3. M Hayet is chaplain to the Brothers at Bayonne.

I humbly thank your Excellency. You have agreed to leave me for an unspecified time at Betharram and by unexpected goodwill, to make me an auxiliary for the residence at Buenos Aires. For that I owe your Excellency eternal gratitude.

I would have been happy, Monsignor, to have been an auxiliary of your congregation. This position could have answered all my desires. But in spite of illusions that one can entertain, I have become convinced of all the difficulties that can be encountered in the conscience of the Bishop to rehabilitate me completely.

Therefore I am not able to insist on that, . I dare to say to your Excellency only, that the good Lord gave me the grace of feeling the need to be under obedience. I abandon myself into your hands, asking your advice and hoping to find, if possible, some position where I can work and save myself.⁵⁶

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609 - To M Dufau⁵⁷, Cure of Pontacq

Betharram, July 1862.

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I deeply share your painful feelings when you heard about the remarks made at Benejacq by M Vignolles⁵⁸ and at Betharram by M Paradis⁵⁹. I cannot stop blaming them and apologising for those who have said these things.

At the first opportunity I will repeat what I have already said more than once: auxiliary priests of the Sacred Heart, by making these remarks become obstacles rather than auxiliaries.

Certainly I am not asking better.....

611 - To Honore Taret

Betharram, 16 July 1862

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I hasten to reply to your letter, but I will have more to say later.

1. I have always acted justly over your plain speaking to your superiors although there may other ways of saying things.

2. You don't need to justify yourself over being reproached about ambition which I have never even thought about. I see this is one of the thousand things you have the misfortune of picking up here and there and which distort your judgements and leave you with the wrong impression, and lead to most regrettable indiscretions.

3. We have had no responsibility for particular facts which have made you very angry. You must satisfy yourself by speaking about this to your superiors, and never speak about these impressions to confreres.

4. You ought to know that what we do, every enterprise that God and his ministers entrust to us, we must begin and pursue as if it has the promise of immortality a fortiori. In fact every undertaking of this kind has a veritable promise of eternity, although it is of earthly duration. Oh! How we need to think about this! Nothing must compromise its earthly duration, in the way you see it, preoccupations, etc... etc...

The duration is hidden, God's business, we must leave this in His hands, without any assumptions, compromises, but respect it, devote ourselves to it, each by himself, without preoccupying himself with anybody else's business, and then what the good God wishes will come about. Make sure you understand this.

5. Our rules are explained so often! And if you need any explanation, can you not consult me in case of doubt? You have caused so much trouble and so much cruel trouble! You ought to under-stand only what you can't avoid is not manifestly sinful, and even this case is foreseen. Do you need to be unhappy from being troubled when you are sheltered from all trouble!

So there are clear and simple things that you have not understood. So get working! Pray and consult M Minvielle, who like myself cares about you; and then God will give you the grace to see and desire what you cannot even suspect, what not to see or need to see or believe and desire.

And so in this way you will become our joy and crown; what I desire with all my heart; and then nothing will prevent your ordination.⁶¹

Read this entire letter to M Minvielle. He will help you understand it. All yours in the Lord.

612 - To Didace Barbe, Superior of the College of St Joseph

22 July 1862.

1. Ask Brother Joannes to tell his parents not to send his young brother to Buenos Aires, without a trade, without having any provision. This would be to abandon him. He will be worth more when he learns a trade. And then, will he not be useful to his parents in their meagre occupations? It is quite dangerous to lower ones status. Brother Joannes should understand. 2. It would be better to have a reunion rather than a separation; but Montevideo is so far! I would also like to strengthen Buenos Aires; I haven't even spoken to Monsignor about it; but it is always the same difficulty: lack of subjects especially Basques.

3. As to the chaplaincy at St Juan, you know what I think. We must allow ourselves to be precious auxiliaries, but never an embarrassment, never obstacles...

While waiting for the reply of Monsignor from Montevideo, we have made M Irigaray parish priest at Sarrance. I am going to replace him. I approve your project: that you keep these two young people at Montevideo with a good teacher⁶². M Harbustan has spoken to me of a Basque who has a school but who would not be happy with this college⁶³. Furthermore this Basque is under an obligation himself; one must hope that he will arrange everything for the best. On the other hand you will find out everything for yourself and you will see what is best to do. You will always have help from these men there, and then you will speak with the apostolic Vicar who seems favourable towards us. Kindly tell Brother Fabian⁶⁴ that I have received his letter with much pleasure; but I always see in it brother Fabian, with his openness which I praise, expecting that I could recall him if need be when I have read his letter⁶⁵. May he always be a good brother. By that he himself will obtain the precious crown.

I will write to brother Joannes. Say to him: *bedi bethi bici, jesus gure bihotcean.* Botcea secula.⁶⁶

We do not quote our real or alleged Constitutions as a way of presenting ourselves to the Bishop, not as auxiliaries, but as embarrassments. May we know what we are and of what spirit we are and never have an air of mistrust; but practice the great rule of brotherly love: to be more prone to see good points rather than to blame, to justify the intention when it is impossible to justify the deeds; and to practice charity without omitting its duties and accepted behaviour.

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614 - To Didace Barbe, Superior of the College of St Joseph

21 August 1862.

Without doubt it would be good to have our own church; but why have it in this great town, where there are so many churches? It seems to me that the difficulties or trouble would count for little for apostles^{67;} and at present this situation seems much more convenient for auxiliaries, whereas building, etc.... appears to me unnecessary. Before everything else continue to do as much good as possible where you are and as you are. The field appears certainly vast and quite likely to attract God's blessings. Changes require some providential sign, like adopting the project suggested by Monsignor of Buenos Aires which on the other hand makes me smile. I am certain that Monsignor of Bayonne would be of the same opinion.

I embrace you and bless you with all my heart.

PS I note with much displeasure the miserliness, at least apparent, of M Larrouy. You need to keep an eye on that, so that, in the case of sickness especially, none of our members suffer, and also all our members are provided with everything they need.

It seems to me that M Sardoy would be happier in all respects. It will be necessary to think how to seize some favourable and providential occasion to employ M Larrouy under your immediate direction, or to send him here, where he will be a very useful missionary once more.

615 - To Carmel Souverbielle⁶⁸

[21 August 1862]

Continue to be the right-hand man of M Barbe. It is the way to be *gaudium et corona nostri Dei totiusque Ecclesiae suae sanctae*⁶⁹.

616 - To brother Joannes

[21 August 1862]

I have received your letter with great pleasure. It has given me great hope in you, the desire to watch your character and to advance as you are doing.

So go forward! Be humble, obedient, happy and reliable; and God will bless you and through you, all your family. See to it! Already you have two well established sisters as religious and the others, he will protect them. I have no doubt! Oh! Only be much more faithful!

617 - To Jean-Baptiste Harbustan

[21 August 1862]

I'm sending you a helper that you already know.⁷⁰ I hope that he will be a great help to begin your work, which could become so important.

We are praying and having others pray more and more for Monte-video. All yours in the Lord.

618 - To brother Fabian

[21 August 1862]

I have received your letter with great pleasure. I recognize only too well brother Fabian in it. In spite of all the troubles that you have told me about, you have nothing to fear by being obedient. In extraordinary cases you must speak with M Barbe. Put yourself in the hands of Divine Providence, if you fall ill, you will want for nothing. M Barbe will come to your help, as he does for all of ours. It is our duty, but also our pleasure, believe me.

Be patient about the hair! The important thing is to be seen to serve God and the society of the Sacred Heart. The best recipe for that, is to be humble, as a little child, obedient, happy and reliable.

619 - To Jean-Baptiste Harbustan⁷¹

22 November 1862.

.....

So you are there as Confessor!!! We hope that the good Lord will bring about whatever you have said to me to his greater honour and glory. We will not fail to pray for this at Notre Dame.

M Barbe, after having spoken with the Vicar Apostolic will certainly let you know what you have to do. I only approve under all the report's on the one side of your fidelity to your duty and on the other side on showing consideration to our good compatriots. I encourage you once more to always follow this line of conduct *fortiter suaviterque disponens omnia*.⁷²

I have received for you part of M Quevedo's⁷³ money of 180 francs. If you have some masses you do not need from this sum, I will keep and use those you have the kindness to give me, let me know how things are shaping in Montevideo. You ought not to doubt the impatience with which we await the next steamer.

Be brave! Virtus in infirmitate perificitur, and then beati qui persecutionem patiuntur propter justitiam. Gaudete et exultate orantes etc...⁷⁴

It is a favour which is very much appreciated. We must make ourselves worthy of it as his Excellency has half promised the ordination here during the holidays in future. For this time we will do what we can. If in need call on M Lassus⁸⁴, M Bellocq⁸⁵ and if you wish I will send M Labourdette on this occasion who appears ready for it. And moreover it will be an occasion to see his performance and abilities. (This is be-tween you and me).

So on Monday of Lent they will bring you 1 M Goailhard, 2 M Labourdette; M Bourdila⁸⁶ if you want him and some others. Just one word if you please.

1. Since M Bellocq is a minor and that his parents are opposed to his entry to Betharram, prudence demands that he continues to give satisfaction to his parents.

2. When he is of age, he will enter Betharram, his parents will not be asked to bear the expenses of his board. In general, when a vocation is evident, it is necessary to help the parents in this way, especially under present circumstances and in our regions

3. In following this procedure, you will avoid another inconvenience; taking on ourselves the responsibility of vocations and of exposing them to a miserable failure: *durum est contra stimula calcitare*.⁸⁷

Furthermore it is a truth based on striking daily experience. Do not forget then these things concerning vocations.

626 - To Jean Florence

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18 December 1862.

1. Most willingly I give authorisation to use these powers received from Rome.

2. Without doubt you must not allow them to make unfavourable impressions on the young against religion⁸⁸; on the contrary they must take from our houses healthy memories. It is a point of the utmost importance, to judge how whosoever conveys the great work of the salvation of souls. Hence it is always necessary to cry without ceasing: have mercy on us! Help us! And to plant and water at the same time.

3. Certainly it's necessary that one works seriously with vocations; and I see nothing better in this matter, nothing more admirable than the Directory⁸⁹ and the Industries especially the first chapter.

4. Choices in general are treated perfectly in the directory; the difficulty is to exercise prudence.... and to apply it all:

1) to be the instrument of the Holy Spirit, just that and nothing but that;

2) to help souls help themselves, by putting them under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, in order to make the complete decision which requires that you leave to souls great spontaneity.

At the same time when you direct someone in holding yourself in different to direct them in the direction where the Holy Spirit blows, who blows where he will, neglecting nothing to direct them on this side in overcoming obstacles. (First and second point of the Method)⁹⁰

To read and practised the exercises oneself waiting on the goodness of God.

As the vocation to be clerical state the world, it needs more signs, more reflection, more trials and discipline than for the vocation of the religious state.

The director must show himself more difficult in giving a definitive decision on the secular vocation than that of a religious (always *suaviter in modo*⁹¹).

St Alphonsus Liguori insisted on that, and the reason that he gives is that experience shows that good priests in the holy ministry are rare.⁹²

Confessor of the faith, a title St Michael gave him; previously he noticed the courage of this priest from his behaviour. In Montevideo there was at that time a conflict between the government and the church. The public authority sent the vicar apostolic in the capital, Monsignor Vera, into exile. He took refuge in Buenos Aires. On the 10th of October 1862, the Minister of worship had assembled the clergy to invite them to recognize as vicar apostolic someone of his own appointment, a priest, Domingo Fernandez. With four other priests Fr Harbustan in a few words indicated his refusal and left the assembly banging the doors. The following Sunday when he was celebrating Mass at seven o'clock, the commissioner accompanied by police came to arrest Fr Harbustan. He fled to the French consulate who escorted him to a French warship, La Fortune, anchored in the harbour of Montevideo. From there he sailed to Buenos Aires.
