A WORD FROM THE SUPERIOR GENERAL

Listening to Saint Michael...

Personality is more than simply distinction. Jesus Christ was not just another man, his person was the Son of God. Before creation there was Space; It was the immensity of God.

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The experience of vocation

Pope Francis wonders if many religious and priests are acting as functionaries, guardians and gatekeepers of holy mysteries rather than as humble servants, close to the people, fired by joy, passion, and a Spirit of mission. These priests and religious are defined more by the things they do than by the inner experience of vocation, which seems lacking in them. These priests and religious are incapable of revealing, in the midst of all that they do, what is at the heart of the inner and outer life of the consecrated person: the mystery of the encounter with the God of Love, in the person of Jesus. In all these outside activities, it is impossible to perceive the intimate experience that once gave their life a new impetus and a powerful motivation. If this experience were to be real again, it is so strong that it would translate into attitudes, words and deeds of joy, and a missionary zeal.



With such signs the life of the priest or the religious would be a challenge capable of deeply stirring the people he met. In fact, the activities carried out by a priest or a religious must result from the fundamental spiritual experience of vocation. Above all, and as the driving force for all the rest, vocation comes from an encounter with the person of Jesus. An encounter arising from a word, an act, an attitude, a relationship, which seems like a call to the depths of oneself: a call which demands an answer, and which will not leave us in peace unless we respond from the same depths, even if the proportions are different. God loves me with boundless love, and I answer him by the offering of all my being, which is infinitely less than His, but which is all I have to offering.

The encounter occurred when I became aware that God was behind this stirring: God who showed me his great love, and in return has aroused my small love, the only answer I could give. This experience requires an accompaniment: this will enable me to verify for myself whether God beckons me by this call, or whether it is an illusion or just my imagination.

The new Ratio Fundamentalis Institutiones Sacerdotalis (Formation Guide for Priests Congregation of the Clergy, 8/12/16) underlines the priority given to the accompaniment and vocational discernment for young seminarians on the part of the formators (educator and spiritual director). This accom-

paniment may be lacking, or rather irregular, infrequent and inconstant; In this case, discernment will be erroneous. Progressing in vocation, the initial experience, as a response to the call of God (an encounter that calls us) risks being obscured or displaced by other priorities, e.g.(i) priority given to academic studies and the consequent prestige (ii) the search for a position, even a pastoral one, which will allow me to live an easy life (iii) by geling with certain people, gradually attaching myself to them, to the point of refusing any change of community or mission (iv) because money manipulated during my ministry ensnared my heart, to the point of forgetting my original purpose, becoming a businessman rather than the man of God I ought to be.

Sometimes a young person in formation has deep wounds of which he is unaware, but which prevent his first call from being clear, from growing and becoming a pivotal experience for him. It should give

then he got on his mare. 120 kms further, at nightfall, came the reunions! Michael Garicoïts wasn't expecting him. Guimon even less so. God knows where he preached! But the former schoolmaster and the refound disciple had so much to talk about. And what a lot of emotion! What was there to eat? Nothing except a bit of bread and the last of the bacon, guickly roasted by the chimney fire. "Never have I eaten with more happiness, or with such a good appetite" said Fr Chirou. It was easy to believe him! In October 1835, the "Betharram staff" gave themselves an order and elected Michael Garicoïts as Superior: each promised obedience and poverty, and renewed the vow of chastity. Chirou was one of the six names quoted by Fr Fondeville in the Congregation's 'birth certificate'. On the 10th September 1841, the first commitments were made, according to the constitution of Monsignor Lacroix: if Fr Guimon managed to obtain the faculty of committing oneself through vows, the bishop minimised the impact of this and insisted on appointing the Superior. What about Fr Chirou's missions? "A pleasant orator, full of gentleness", he was a missionary. However, we only know of two missions he undertook, in 1838 and in 1856. A true missionary, he didn't understand opening up schools. He moved away from the founder's demands and leaned towards the Bishop's opinions which were less restrictive. Was it to push him away that Michael Garicoïts appointed him to Oloron and then to Sarrance? However, Fr Chirou guaranteed he loved Fr Garicoïts more than anyone. When, on 14th May 1863, the founder died, Monsignor Lacroix was there for the funeral, and to put his ideas in

place and to only authorise voluntary vows. He appointed Jean Chirou as superior – out of that very first team, he was closest to the Bishop. The promised new constitution was slow to come; the community suffered from this lack of clarity.

However, in 1868, Monsignor Lacroix proposed a vote at the assembly of priests: 23 voted - 16 for obligatory vows and 7 for voluntary vows. Two thirds were loyal to the original ideal. And as for Fr Chirou during this time? A good administrator, he continued the legacy of the founder. If Fr Larrouy, another companion from the start, had dared to write to him: "the spirit of the foundation has been extinguished and the thoughts of the founder destroyed", he would have recognised this himself. "Poor Fr Garicoïts, how he has suffered from our opposition! ... I see it clearly now; he had good reason to stand against us 100 times." The epitaph on his grave reminds us that we owe the restoration of Betharram's Calvarv to Fr Chirou. Between 1867 and 1873, with Fr Basilide Bourdenne as architect. he fulfilled Garicoït's desire, thanks to donations from pilgrims, to sacrifices made by the community and the contribution of the "colony of America". The benediction was planned for 14th September 1873. It was to happen without him. A sudden illness took him from us on 29th August. Fr Auguste Etchécopar succeeded him and permanently established the Congregation.

THE FIRST COMPANIONS OF MICHAEL GARICOITS

Jean Chirou, the first companion

WITH MICHAEL GARICOÏTS AND SIMON GUIMON, THE SOCIETY OF BETHARRAM WAS JUST AN ABSTRACT IDEA. WITH THE ARRIVAL OF FR CHIROU, THE PROJECT STARTS TAKING THE SHAPE OF A TRIO, THE BEGINNING OF A REAL COMMUNITY.

Lots of questions about Fr Jean Chirou. Firstly, why call him the "first companion" when Simon Guimon was already with Michael Garicoïts? He was the first to come to rejoin his former schoolmaster; at that time, Guimon was absent, busy, as so often, going from mission to mission.

Who was Jean Chirou? He was the first to arrive in the new society in 1834. He was also the first to succeed the founder. in 1863. And between those two dates? The Betharram historians are not very talkative. Born in 1808 in Pontacq – 13 kms from Lourdes - he was at the Betharram Seminary when he felt uncertain about his vocation; he was tempted to live out another life somewhere else. So, he looked for a good advisor - why not this Garicoïts that his friends feared so much? He weighed things up, made a decision, and wasn't disappointed. "You do well not to blindly want to do what others do... have the courage to show yourself to be a good and fervent seminarian. Leave your friends who are full of the spirit of the time; give your whole self to the Lord. He wants you to be a saint and a very holy priest.". The seminarian would never forget it. From 1830, the future founder confided his plans in him. He was ready to follow him. He was iust sub-deacon and Michael Garicoïts had not yet met Fr Leblanc in Toulouse. Now a priest, on the 17th December 1831, Jean Chirou became a curate in Morlaas. On 27th



May 1833, he asked to rejoin the Betharram Society, which Monsignor D'Arbou himself desired. The bishop agreed, but appointed him to Louvigny. A little patience! In mid-August 1834, he was sent urgently to Urt at the other end of the diocese. And there, a miracle! On Sunday 28th September 1834, just before Mass, he received a letter: he could go to Betharram. The homily was short, vespers followed straightaway ... and meaning to his life, helping him experience adversity, not as a disaster, but as an opportunity to grow and mature. Sometimes these wounds cause the religious or the priest to conceal by his conduct, the identity of priest or religious that is rightfully his. He wears a mask to hide his fragility, and if he reveals himself before others, it is without being aware of it. Far from being on fire with the strength and mystery of his vocation, he presents himself as a biblical expert, a specialist in the sacred, a promoter of fashionable devotions... The statistics of the increasingly frequent abandonment of religious and priestly life send us an alarming signal. This constant and persistent loss has reached damaging proportions in addition to the lack of vocations in certain countries ... This phenomenon has multiple causes.

Among these, there is one that seems decisive to me although it is seldom mentioned in the dynamics of vocation, especially that of vocational fidelity. I refer to the experience of the vocational call, in other words to the consciousness that one has of it. In fact, without the consciousness of being called, the vocation does not exist, any more than the possibility of a path of formation or a path of a lasting fidelity. When this consciousness exists, the person sets out, with all that he is, at the service of the plan of life to which God calls him. When it disappears or diminishes, the first vocational experience disappears, and the vocation itself runs into great danger. This is what has motivated many departures among those who lost the enthusiasm of their first call. If this joy is lacking, it is impossible for them

to live their vocation with devotion and in a spirit of service, and they eventually abandon it (Jesús María Palacios Alcántara, "(In)consistent", Publicaciones Claretianas, Madrid 2016, p. 42-43). The initial experience of vocation does not end with entry to the pre-postulate or the novitiate; On the contrary, it must continue to grow and strengthen, in contact with reality, through experiences, relationships, studies, and especially accompaniment during initial and ongoing training. This vocational experience, mature, integral and realistic, is at the foundation of perpetual vows and priestly ordination. With perpetual vows and ordination, it becomes effective and operational. A mature vocational experience makes the religious a joyful witness of Love and an indefatigable seeker of God, especially among life's wounded, to console and care for them, restore their dignity by revealing to them that God loves them and that they too can love Him - and thus achieve "the same happiness"..

This is the witness of one participant missionary: "We were 12 in my small group, just like the apostles of the Lord. We carried out the mission in a cluster of hovels in a place called Santa Cruz. No electricity, no gas, no drinking water were available. Adding to that, the scorching sun seemed to beat us. But our joy made us overcome all these difficulties. We lived these days side by side with simple, generous and welcoming people. They offered us the best they could afford:

mate, corn pancake (tortillas) and some chairs so that we could sit and speak about God. We threw up games with the children and the youth, while the adults were looking on in amusement. We concluded our mission with a Eucharistic celebration. The farewell was heartbreaking because we had grown very fond of them. May God bless them all".

A MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP OF ROME



A fragile treasure

IN ITS PLENARY SESSION, THE CONGREGATION FOR INSTITUTES OF CONSECRATED LIFE AND SOCIETIES OF APOSTOLIC LIFE DEALT WITH AN IMPORTANT TOPIC - POPE FRANCIS SAYS: BEING FAITHFUL TO AND LEAVING ONE'S VOCATION, PERSEVERANCE IS PUT TO THE TEST...

....Vocation, like faith itself, is a treasure we carry in clay vessels (cf. 2 Cor 4: 7); That is why we must take care of it, as we take care of the most precious things, so that no one will steal this treasure from us, and that this treasure does not lose its beauty over time. This care is a duty that is above all for us personally, who have been called to follow Christ more closely, with faith, hope and charity, cultivated daily in prayer and reinforced by a good theological and spiritual formation that protects us against passing fashions and cultural fads and allows us to progress by being strong in faith. Only on this basis is it possible to practice evangelical counsels and have « the same feelings as Christ » (Phil 2: 5). Vocation is a gift that we have received from the Lord, who has « looked at us and loved us » (cf. Mk 10:21), calling us to follow him in the consecrated life. But it also implies a responsibility for the one who has received this gift. With the grace of the Lord, each of us is called to assume responsibly a personal commitment for his own human, spiritual and intellectual growth, and at the same time to maintain the

flame of his vocation. This implies that in turn we always have our eyes fixed on the Lord, always paying attention to walking according to the logic of the Gospel, without succumbing to the criteria of worldliness. So many times, great infidelities begin from small diversions or distractions. In this light too, it is important to hear St. Paul's exhortation: « now is the time for you to awake from sleep» (Rom 13:11) [...]

Widen the space of your tent...

"This congregation has completed all canonical requirements to be officially present and permitted for pastoral works in the Archdiocese of Ho Chi Minh City. This communication from the Archdiocese of Ho Chi Minh City (signed by the Episcopal Vicar for Consecrated Life, Fr. Thomas Vu Quang Trung SJ) gave the official signal of the Betharramite presence in Vietnam. This is a very important recognition.

Although our community is made up of a small number of religious, the Diocese of Ho Chi Minh judged that our charism was a wealth for the Vietnamese Church. Basically, that is the meaning of our presence in Vietnam. Our intention is not to found great works. We have come here, but not because we are short of vocations in Europe but because we are convinced that our charism is a benefit for the whole Church and that it should not be relegated to a limited area. Even before Betharram was present in this country, our charism was welcomed by two young Vietnamese men: Joseph Tuan and Peter Do, who are currently scholastics in Sampran, Thailand.

Like a small seed in the furrow of Vietamese history, our presence has become a focus for vocations in a year and a half.

Several young people have already experienced a period of vocational discernment. Some of them are already members of our family: in addition to the two young people who live in Sampran, a third young man lives in our seminary in Mangalore (India). Another young man is going to leave for Mangalore soon. Others will soon be welcomed into the Betharramite community of Ho Chi Minh City.

Let us recall that this presence was only possible thanks to the "Here I am" of two

young Betharramite religious: Father Yesudas Kuttappassery (India) and Fr. Albert Sa-at Prathansantiphong (Thailand). Their enthusiastic and resourceful spirit (characteristic of the beginnings of any mission) has supported them in the face of difficulties. They knew how to bring their faith and courage into action. Having witnessed their first steps in Vietnam, I can say that the Lord has blessed them and through them the whole Congregation.

Our presence was also made possible thanks to the Bishop of the Diocese of Thanh Hoa (Mgr Joseph Chi Linh) who, by putting at our disposal a part of the diocesan seminary in Ho Chi Minh City, gave us the opportunity to set up our presence benefiting from a very warm welcome.

Our presence has been possible thanks to many benefactors in Europe and Latin America who, sensitive to the Betharramite mission in Vietnam, have offered economic assistance to support the fledgling community.

Our presence was made possible by many Vietnamese Christian families who, after learning about the community, helped them to meet their daily needs, supplying food, money and liturgical furnishings. These families gave especially to our brothers the certainty of being surrounded by friends, **The Superior General, with his Council, invited three brothers to the next General Chapter**: Fr. Sergio Gouarnalusse of the Vicariate of Argentina-Uruguay ; Fr. Yesudas Kuttappassery of the new community in Vietnam & Fr. Angelo Recalcati as assistant secretary.

With the advice of his Council, he approved the Acts of the Regional Chapter of the Saint Michael Garicoits Region.

As a reply to the request submitted by the Regional Superior of the Fr Etchecopar Region, the Superior General, with the advice of his Council, approved the **acceptance of the** *Santa Isabel de Portugal* **Parish in Paso de los Toros, in the diocese of Tacuarembó-Ribera** (Fr. which Paraguay is at the forefront of the world. Public health and education services are those of an underdeveloped country. There is and will be no land "without misfortune": the challenge is to train citizens be more to aware, less selfish and more

Paraguayan people: kindness, solidarity, hospitality, artistic and musical talents. Anyone who has known Paraguay will always feel nostalgic about it.

As the plane descends, you see large new buildings, symbols of the remarkable economic growth of the last years. There is, it is said, a lot of money in the banks, interest is high and the macroeconomy is doing well. The same cannot be said for the microeconomy.

Politically, there is a lack of training in citizenship. President Stroessner's 35 years of military dictatorship had a negative impact on the participation of the majority: it was forbidden to speak openly and express opinions, and of course people were not able to vote. Today, democratically elected governments succeed each other, but the mechanisms of control by both the citizens and the institutions themselves are insufficient: this encourages corruption, in

committed to the service of the country. It is the mission that Pope Leo XIII entrusted to the first Betharramites when they arrived in Paraguay in 1904. Through education in our 5 beautiful colleges, through parish ministry and social services to the weakest people, our mission continues to be current and attractive.

Paraguay is waiting for us: without superficial prejudices or judgments, simply with our desire to know, to listen, to value, to learn, to forgive. It is certainly a blessed people, open and sensitive to everything that comes from Nandejara [God] and from the Virgin Mary, as the waters of Ypacarai Lake are blessed, on whose shores the General Chapter will be held. Blessed waters is the etymological meaning of the name Ypacarai, for Brother Bolaños blessed them in his time to remove evil spirits.

One year and a half in Vietnam

A NEW FOUNDATION IS MADE OF SMALL STEPS. OUR CONFRERES, FRS YESUDAS AND ALBERT GO OVER THEIR FIRST PERIOD IN VIETNAM. AFTER OVERCOMING THE FIRST ADMINISTRATIVE HURDLES, BETHARRAM IS GETTING A FOOTHOLD AND SETTLING DOWN.

God's providence continues... As I arrived in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam I had no idea about this new country and its culture. I had not known anyone, I did not speak the language; everything was new to me. People do not speak English and it was difficult to communicate and to express our needs. My problem was to find out how to get the visa for a long period. I tried to communicate the needs to the Vietnamese priests where I was living but to no avail; they said that it is difficult to get the long term visa for people coming from abroad; again I was discouraged. How is it possible for me to solve this problem? I remembered the words of Saint Michael Garicoïts: "forward always forward." It was God's providence that I met Fr. Thomas Trung who is the episcopal vicar of the diocese. He said he did not know much about the visa but that there were priests from India living here for many years, and he introduced me to frs. Jerrin and Felix who belong to Guanellians. I contacted Fr. Jerrin who took me to a catholic visa agent and introduced me to him; they promised that they would get the visa for Fr Sa-at and myself. We submitted all the documents and after a couple of days we got the visa with work permit. We thank God for this wonderful work! It was God's providence. As we started our community, we had 6 candidates from different parts of Vietnam. It was not easy to handle the situation but everything went on well

although we had to face some problems and difficulties. Some interference in the formation made us think about changing the place. But where? Again God's came to help us in the person of Fr. Dominic (Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament) and his friend, Mrs Kieu-Dung Nguyrn who lives in the USA. This lady is ready to give her house (for four years) for the formation of our young boys without paying any rent: we have only to take care of the house for her. All her family members in USA are happy about this. Fr. Dominic took the initiative to find some sponsors and have a small chapel in the house. People are very supportive and helpful. They are very happy to know about Betharram and its spirituality. At the end, with the help of some people we made a small chapel and some renovations.

Then in the presence of the Superior general, Fr Gaspar, and the Bursar General, Fr Graziano, and Fr. Thomas Trung we blessed the chapel and the house. The next step was to register our names in the local police station; once again God's Providence helped us to overcome this hurdle: Fr. Dominic asked his friend, a lawyer, to come to our rescue. The social and economic situation in Paraguay

The two hydroelectric power stations built on the Parana constitute the greatest wealth potential: Itaipu, which last December broke the world record for electricity production with 100 million MWh and the Yacyreta power station also figuring among the largest in the world. Admittedly the water resources are to be shared with Brazil and Argentina, and the debt contracted for the construction of these plants still weighs heavily, but the future is promising.

Paraguay therefore presents itself to visitors as a beautiful country with great potential. For some, it's a kind of Switzerland of the Americas. With nearly 7 million inhabitants and a territory of just over 400,000 km², it is the fourth largest exporter of soya beans worldwide and the sixth largest of beef; a fertile land which offers the possibility of three crops per year and which does not suffer earthquakes or major climatic disturbances. It is one of the countries with the highest growth rate (more than 14.5% in 2010). According to a survey published some time ago, this is the country where people say they are happiest. Young people are numerous: a quarter of the population is between 15 and 29 years old.

Another interesting aspect is bilingualism: Guarani and Spanish are the two official languages. 90% of the population speaks Guarani, but most people also speak Spanish. In everyday conversations, they prefer their mother tongue and particularly when they want to express deep feelings. In short, the appearance is Spanish, but the heart is Guarani, which is clearly seen in traditional dances.

There are some very large fortunes, 38% of the population make up the middle class, while 20% live in poverty and do not have access to essential goods: the unfair distribution of wealth, rampant corruption and an administration with inadequate resources are certainly negative factors and cause widespread discontent. It is rare, however, for a Paraguayan to complain about his situation. He is able to say that he is well, even when he feels oppressed; he lives dreaming of better times and places, of the famous land "without misfortune," so rooted in the Guarani heart.

In recent decades, there has been a high level of immigration, particularly from the East and the Arab countries, attracted by the commercial growth linked to the Itaipu plant. Significant communities of Europeans have also made it possible to repopulate Paraguay, after the genocide of the war of the Triple Alliance. In 1870, after the massacre, there were only 116,350 inhabitants, only 10 per cent of whom were men, youths and adults. This explains the compelling need for repopulation and the large number of single mothers and children not recognized by their fathers. However, these disturbing aspects do not blot out the human qualities of the

The spiritual exercises with the rules for the Discernment of Spirits (The Ignatian Spiritual Exercises) which I began during my novitiate is carried out till today and thanks to the Jesuit spiritual directors who help me to be in touch with my feelings and inner self. With humility I am able to name, claim, tame and aim the feelings within me which are helpful in coming to contact with my true person. The very project of interiorising and exteriorising my life with true renunciation according to the Gospel values and practising the virtues Christ and His Sacred Heart gives me a new vision of my life.

Thanks to the meditative words of Fr. Gaspar Fernandez in every issue of the NEF, with a goal set before me and looking at Christ, my interior Master, I am able to offer myself without any reservation to the Lord to become a joyful religious.

I always set before me the words of my spiritual director that I have to be a person steeped in the wisdom of the Cross to ultimately realize that Calvary is the only way to meet the Risen Lord. My life in our congregation moves me to genuinely desire God's will and be truly open to God and the events of life. As I have fully surrendered myself to the Lord in our religious family, the rest of my life is going to be a process to come to maturity of spirit, to bring my soul to an ever-deeper knowledge of, and an ever-greater sensitivity to the Spirit of God. As the years pass by, I become more and more rooted in the life God has called me and in the life I have chosen in my family of Betharram. The charism of St. Michael is the lifeblood of our religious

family. St. Michael must be reincarnated for us Betharramites in the people we know and love today. That is what I am trying to put in practice in my diaconate ministry place, St. Anthony's Shrine, Tuticorin, Tamilnadu, and trying to 'read the face of God' in knowing how he wishes me to respond to the concrete apostolic demands of my life. Nothing could be such a source of strength and encouragement to me, in my human pilgrimage as a missionary of Betharram, as the realization that I have a God who chose to experience fully our struggle to live by faith in the midst of darkness. I am called to be, and can become, like him, not by my own efforts but by the same gift of grace of God.

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During this one and half years experience in Vietnam I felt like the baby practicing walking. But this walk is guided by the grace of God who has a plan for me. He provides everything for me through the project which the Congregation put in my hands, even though I didn't agree with some details of the project: for example about receiving the candidates immediately. In my opinion for the first year I preferred to see, to learn, to live and to study the language and then start to receive the candidates. But through the present situation, I can understand the reality of life and the system of formation in Vietnam. I would like to summarize my experience in 6 dimensions.

The human dimension; What I learned and practiced in my formation years, I continue in my daily life as a priest here. Of course, I have to do more than my seminarian life, I have to be an example for the candidates, I have to learn from the priests, from the religious, from the candidates and from the people in Vietnam. This is what I have been trying in this period in Vietnam.

The spiritual dimension; every day, I pray and ask God to give me a conscience to live, to listen, to do and to speak. I always believe that if I do the will of God, He will do everything for me; I only try my best. And God provides everything to me through different groups of people in Vietnam and from others places.

The community dimension; this is the big

challenge for me: to teach the candidates how to live the community life. The community life is to accept the differences of the people, of culture and the background, of the family.

The intellectual dimension; before teaching others how to do something I have to practice it myself. It is a great time for me to learn the language, the culture, the life style and what are the real and important needs in my religious life.

The missionary dimension; One and half year is the time for me to see, to listen and to learn. I will try to open myself to God and to people. The cultural and social dimension; I like the Vietnamese culture and the life style. Vietnamese people are very friendly. They give great respect to the priests and they are very active in their faith. But as a Betharramite I have to bring the charism of the congregation to Vietnamese culture. Of course the culture is very important but not all the aspects of the culture is appropriate for the religious life.

I would like to thank God for providing everything for me. Thanks to Mgr Joseph Nguyen Chin Linh Archbishop of Hue and Thanh Hoa, thanks to all the fathers and brothers in the center of Thanh Hoa in Saigon; a special thanks to Mary Nguyen Thi Kieu Dung the owner of the house where we are living now; thanks to Fr. Dominic, a person who provided this new house for us; thanks to different benefactors and to all those who help us in different ways here in Vietnam.
