He made for the attic, jumped over beams, broke down a door and with an axe attacked the timber with all the power of his body. The smoke blinded him? The sparks burned his face? He hacks and will save the sanctuary, even at the peril of his life! True enough, he saved the sanctuary; he won and tomorrow, he will rebuild what had been destroyed.

A word from the Superior General

In truth and in Love Ephesians 4,14-16

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105th year 10th series, n°21 14th November 2007 Last October while visiting the communities in Brazil, I spent an afternoon with Father Dante Angelelli, 96 years of age. We chatted about lots of things. At one point I asked him "What do you think of the new Pope, Benedict XVI?" "He's the Pope, that's all" was his reply. Another time the same question was put to me. And I replied: "I appreciate him very much for I can see that he is very involved in looking for and defending the truth, without bothering about the attacks on his image: Regensburg, Aparecida, the motu proprio on John XXIII's Mass." My answer surprised my questioner somewhat; he was expecting me to come up with the usual criticism of the Pope as a progressist, the sort of answer which I sometimes gave as the easy way out, under the influence of today's thought. Quite the contrary of the Pope's attitude.

Our Pope is the witness to truth and love. Already in his Episcopal coat of arms, he had inscribed: *Co-operatores Veritatis*. He feels entirely free as he proclaims and defends the beauty of Truth which is Jesus Christ, he must think that he has nothing to lose. Opinion makers will carry on saying "*What else could we expect? It's Ratzinger!*" For Benedict XVI Truth is supreme. It's not something abstract; it's a person, Jesus Christ and his manner of understanding the reality of the Creator and Creation. But he is also the Pope of Love: *Deus caritas est*. The theologian-Pope has amazed us all by reminding

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us of something as simple and fundamental for our Christian life as love.

Truth and Love always go hand in hand. Truth must not be belittled by putting it at the service of anything other than love. The first sign of love that we can give anyone is to tell him the truth. Love is Truth in action. Love is the revelation of Truth. It is therefore important for a Christian to live in truth and in love. The Truth will set us free.

- To live in truth and in love means to respect the opinions of others while not denying the truth of one's own identity;
- To live in truth and in love means demanding respect for our identity with the same courage as we respect the identity of others, without being fanatical "always have your answer ready for people who ask you the reason for the hope you all have," as the Apostle says (I Peter 3.15).

In the terrible years after the 1789 Revolution, the Church was constantly under attack. Wanting ardently to take the Church's defence. Father Garicoits probably would have liked to proceed with greater speed. If it was God's will that there should be delays, it was to allow him the time to reflect and pray. Little by little his ideas become clear and this is how he resumed them for his spiritual sons:

- When he came on earth. Jesus said: "Father. I have come to do your will". Let's say likewise, every day. Better still: Let's do it everywhere, and in all things. And, if you need a second model, look to the Virgin Mary who called herself "the Lord's handmaid".

- Father, by what name shall we be known?

- Since we want to serve the Flock with a heart like that of Jesus, let's be known as "the Priests of the Sacred Heart".

For these priests this wasn't any ordinary name. Cleared of all pride and selfishness, there is room only for Jesus in their life. So it is no longer their heart, mind or will which decides and acts: it is the heart, mind and will of Jesus acting in them. Consequently what success where ever they went preaching a mission, opening a primary school or a college! "God's commando" was well on its way!

When the mission has matured in the silence and the shade of the Virgin of the Beautiful Branch, it suddenly expanded. New candidates came to take their place under the direction of Fr Garicoits; some groups went preaching missions, others opened Catholic schools and colleges in the midst of awful difficulties. Priests from Oloron came to learn to be of greater service in their diocese. Soon the Basques who had emigrated to Argentina began to ask for a "commando". This was the beginning of the spread of the Congregation throughout the world; from 1856 onwards the Mother House in Betharram spread its wings.



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From 1830 to 1860. the project of Fr. Garicoits became more precise and developed. The priests of the Sacred Heart grew in number... The expansion was told by Rose Dardennes in 1967, and is reexamined by our readers in 2007.

Spreading St Michael's spirituality

From the individual to the universal

All spirituality is a doorway to the Gospel. What Michael Garicoits discovered is known worldwide and becomes international in so far as on July 6^{th} 1947 the Church recognised his saintliness. The universality of his spirituality was launched. The Congregation became the depository of his spiritual treasure. It is up to the Congregation to make it her way of life since this was the project of the foundation in the first place.

1. The story of an appropriation

Father Auguste Etchecopar, the first novice master, organised the Congregation along the lines received directly from St Michael himself, particularly in what concerns formation. He is the man who really organised and harmonised the spirituality of this Saint. He collected everything that could be preserved and read of the thoughts, words and writings of the Founder. He really is *St Michael's Evangelist*.

Little by little according as its missionary activities grew, the Congregation was responsible for transmitting to Christians a message which was universal from the beginning. Our religious life has its origins in St Augustine's rule, adapted by the early Betharram Constitutions. St Michael's spirituality didn't figure there, apart from devotion to the Holy Spirit and to the Sacred Heart considered as a model. There was nothing very deep, apart from a few phrases taken from the thoughts of the Founder.

When in 1947 Fr Garicoits became St Michael, Fr Duvignau undertook an important work of research and organisation of the Saint's **thoughts**. It was then that his core texts appeared: *La Doctrine Spirituelle* (1949), *Père, Me Voici* (1962) and *Un Maître Spirituel* (1963) were to be the means of getting to know the Founder. Apart from these texts, there were few developments in the knowledge of his doctrine spiritual in the 1960s.

Then these works had to be translated so as to get beyond simple slogans: FVD (*Fiat Voluntas Dei*), *Me Voici*, "little,

- The Christians caught between two blocks, Israeli and Moslem, are in danger of losing hope and of being tempted to emigrate. In fact many of our Christians have already emigrated. We don't really know what the future holds for us and we don't want to lose hope.

Personally, how do you see the future of the Catholic Church in the Holy Land?

- The future of the Church depends largely on the political situation of the region. We are praying for peace and we work for that. We try to build bridges between the two communities. On the other hand, the return of pilgrims to the Holy Land is a cure for our wounds.

According to you, what role could our Congregation play in the Holy Land?

- Having directed the seminary for 50 years, Betharram is not unknown in the Holy Land. I have just given a retreat to the priests of the diocese and I could see that those priests really appreciate us. We can't abandon them. I think that we must continue a discrete presence with the Carmelites and be present in the midst of the priests of the diocese.

5 MINUTES WITH... Fr. Pierre Grech

From the 21st to 26th October, Father Grech spent two days at the Generalate and four at the Vatican at St Martha's. To get to know him better we put some questions to our former General Superior (1975 – 1987)

Nef - How and for what reason have you abandoned Jerusalem for Rome?

- I am the General Secretary of the Bishops' Conference for the Middle East; every year we have a General Assembly of all the Bishops of the region. This year this assembly has taken place in Rome.

What was the programme and why do such assemblies seem important to you?

- During this meeting we prepared the synod of Bishops from the whole world which will take place in Rome in October 2008 on the theme: The Word of God in the life of the Church. In the Middle East with its suffering, war and violence, such meetings between bishops are more and obedient, unswerving, happy", *Flying Camps*. These ideas formed part of St Michael's spirituality without swallowing it up. Extracts from his Correspondence were translated. An English translation of *Maitre Spirituel* by Fr Harrison appeared, but was never published. In Italy Fr Paniga brought out a brochure on the life of the Saint; *Aqui Estoy* gave the essential of the *Doctrine Spirituelle* in Spanish. All these works were for home consumption, so to speak.

Vatican II had encouraged each Congregation to review its founding texts and to rewrite its Constitutions. In 1975 the new Rule of Life for Betharram was published and opened with the Manifesto of 1838. It was here that St Michael had summarised the spirit of the Congregation, beginning with a contemplation of the mystery of Christ. *Ecce venio – Here I am:* this is the first act of the Sacred Heart; this is the heart of the message of faith given by St Michael. In *Family News* of 1980, the message is fully explained. In the following years the message will be fully shared within the Church (In the 1980s the cover of Family News bears the slogan "Here I am" in seven languages, including Basque and Thai.)

Two important moments in the history of the Congregation will clarify the discovery and sharing of this spirituality. First of all the gathering in 1985 in Betharram for the 150th anniversary of the Congregation, prepared by a session in the Holy Land. The Religious find there the fundamental ideas of the early days, through a meditated reading of the 1838 Manifesto. Then in 1997 for the bicentenary of the birth of St Michael different initiatives are proposed in each region. In July 1997 an important meeting took place in Betharram regrouping religious and laity (in all 200 persons in the gymnasium). This marks the beginning of greater participation and deeper bonds of fraternity.

Two years later, for the first time the laity was invited to the most important meeting of the Congregation, together with delegates from the different countries. At this 1999 General Chapter the Betharram family stretches out officially to the laity who drink at the same source.

Consequently between our fragility and our great ambitions, we think that *Me Voici* of the Congregation, assumed with St Michael's ardour, is the humble but powerful yeast in the dough which will make a new world to rise again.

Fr. Pierre Lagouardat (1918-2007)

France

Born on the 16^{th} January 1918 at Jasses (diocese of Bayonne), baptised on the 19^{th} , Pierre Lagouardat made his First Vows at Balarin on the 15^{th} August 1938; he made his final vows on Easter Monday, 26^{th} April 1943, in Palestine. He was ordained priest in Bethlehem, 20th February 1944. His apostolic religious life was spent outside his native land: Morocco and Algeria to begin with, followed by 44 years in Paraguay, at Asuncion: at St Joseph's College either as teacher or prefect (1950 – 1957) then St Joseph's Parish, first as curate and finally as parish priest. In 1994 he chose to retire to Betharram where he died on the morning of 25^{th} October 2007.

Father Pierre Lagouardat travelled along the Road to Em-

maus, on foot perhaps. For it was at Emmaus that he

That same day, two disciples were on their way to a village called Emmaus, seven miles from Jerusalem... As they were talking, Jesus Himself came up and walked by their side. (Lk 24,13ss)

But he must leave North Africa, and his family in Bearn. Now begins for him his mission in Paraguay. Actually, he felt as though he was in heaven, active, generous, and appreciated. As a curate, he was in contact with people of all ages, but he was particularly attentive to the aged.

After 50 years, it was hard to leave this corner of paradise, where for a long time he had been with "Pai

ity? First of all, in the **Province of Rio de la Plata** (Argentina and Uruguay) in 1987 in a declaration intended for the Youth Movement magazine, Fr Gaspar Fernandez tried giving a definition of *a young Betharramite*. He stressed the importance of the seriousness of the Incarnation, of the discovery and following of Christ from the contemplation of the "great mystery": the Son of God has become man", a précis of Christian life at the school of St Michael. From this deeprooted spirituality flows the seriousness of the new evangelisation. For such missionary activity COLAMIBE was launched; then came FALABE, the Betharramite laity for whom Father Daniel Martin published in 1999 *Hojas de espiritualidad betharramita*. These were quarterly pamphlets with a topic. It is the same spirit: developing together the charism and commitment to the service of the Church.

How did the rank and file take hold of St Michael's spiritual-

In **France**, in December 1986, Fr Henri Lamasse edited a pamphlet entitled "A spirituality for all." In the summer of 1989 during a summer camp organised at Betharram a dozen youngsters discovered the place and the message; at the end of their stay they were joined by laity from Limoges and Pibrac seeking the same source. Thus, little by little, the fraternity "*Here I am*" began to be a reality.

In *Italy*, the *Association Il Mosaico* came into being from the accompaniment of HIV patients in Monteporzio (former house of studies now a hostel). For the laity as for the religious, the work with the sick is helped by the spiritual project of St Michael. Other groups are formed with the Italian priests, especially in parishes. After 1999, Betharramite spirituality helped launch a cycle of conferences entitled: "To be a man according to the ways of God"; there are two directions: *cordiality* (reaction of the heart) and *the choice of poverty*. Finally, the village schools opened by our Central African missionaries rely from 1986 onwards on a network of sponsorships – about 400 in all. Thanks to material solidarity something of Betharramite spirituality gets through.

In England, the "Companions of Betharram" were launched

crease, although down on the glorious days of times gone by. (At present there are 5650 pupils in our 5 colleges.) The Direction, both academic and administrative, has been entrusted to the laity under the guardianship of the Vice-Province for all questions juridical, accounting and educational. Regular meetings of the Directors and the Administrators help us to understand that we form one big family and that together we assure the great mission entrusted to us by the Church and the Congregation. Thanks to sponsorships by teachers and parents, St Michael Garicoits College gives free education to some 40 children from the streets.

Our next important mission is the service of the local Church in four big parishes that have been entrusted to us. The two parishes – San Joaquin and La Colmena - are rural parishes; the other two – San Jose and Ciudad Del Este are city parishes. During the July holidays, with the team of priests we organised a Mission at which there were 92 participants (pupils and teachers from our Colleges, religious and laity from our parishes). In the course of one week they visited all the houses and villages of San Joaquin, and organised meetings in more than 30 Christian communities. As a result some of the participants wanted to take part in the Vice-Province's vocations meetings and even asked to be admitted as Betharramite postulants.

The formation and counselling of postulants and students constitutes the third axe of our mission in Paraguay. This is undertaken by the formation team – Father Angelo Recalcati, Brother Mauro Ulrich de Oliveira and Father Javier Irala. God continues to bless us with many vocations. Yet, for today's young people, it is not easy to be faithful to the Lord's call; the modern world is attractive, especially as globalisation encourages the youth of poor countries to copy models from elsewhere and even to emigrate to Spain or the USA. A one-to-one accompaniment can help the young aspirant to give himself to Christ and to come to realise that the resulting human blossoming far exceeds anything that the consumer society has to offer.

in 1985 so as to associate as closely as possible with the religious, those Christians working at the grass roots. The idea was to promote co-responsibility, mutual awareness and friendliness. In Worcester, in a property belonging to the Congregation, a guest house was entrusted to a group of laity. Finally, in Birmingham in a part where immigrants are in the majority, a Betharramite parish offers help, meetings and support to immigrants. Here is a further example of how the Congregation is at the heart of everything international.

In *Thailand* several possibilities for collaboration exist. For example, not far from the Golden Triangle, there is a children's village looked after by a community of three priests and a lay person. The children's schooling is taken care of, as is the learning of professional skills (weaving to prevent girls falling into prostitution) and Christian formation.

In *Ivory Coast*, where Betharram is present since 1959, the community at Adiapodoume revived the *Fraternity Ne Me* in 1980, Handbooks are published, and meetings organised; nationwide, retreats are proposed, helping to spread the Betharramite spirit.

In *Brazil* as well the Lay Associates got organized: seven groups gather together regularly around our Parishes and Colleges. A particularly meaningful annual gathering makes them feel more and more part of the big family of Betharram. On the same line, in Asuncion, *Paraguay*, a group gathers around Fr Constancio Lopez.

The international dimension of St Michael's message helps to make known that the Love of God is at the heart of our faith; *It has pleased God to be loved*. In the present state of the Church, and with the first Encyclical of Pope Benedict XVI, the God of love who is revealed to us has won over the hearts of Christians. In its own way, the spirituality of St Michael has been largely responsible for this success.

We must increase the knowledge of this God who is Father, who helps us to live out his project of Love and calls us *to procure a similar happiness for others*. **Family News**

From the logbook of Mangalore The Maria Kripa community consists of 16 religious in formation and 2 fathers. Once in a month there is a day of recollection for a spiritual renewal. Twice a month are proposed literary programs, which consist of speeches on various subjects and some entertaining programs. For the World Mission Sunday, the community conducted some entertainment programs inviting the children from Balagraha and Vijava Mary: all of them have enjoyed it. As we've remembered the first death anniversary of Fr. Protection of the artistic heritage A new project is launched in Betharram: the restoration of the Stations of the Cross rebuilt by St Michael Garicoits in the middle of the 19th century. The wear and tear of time will be repaired, at the cost of 1.360.000 euros (global budget including approximately 75 % State subsidies). The Sanctuary association appeals to public generosity, for covering its part of the expenses. The target is quite clear: *in 1616 the cross raised itself, in 2016 the Calvary will be restored!*

The Priests of the diocese and the members of the parish council made us welcome; the first contacts were supported by an Ursuline religious, Sister Marianne, who has been of great help in so many ways. Ideas to help us make greater progress

On Saturday 6th and Sunday 7th October the 1st national Congress of Betharramite parishes was held in Albavilla. There were about 60 lay members in all, coming from Bitonto, Montemurlo, Rome, Parme, Lissone, Milan and Castellazzo.

This was certainly a very successful meeting, judging from the quality of the programme. Particularly appreciated were the talks given by Sergio Lanza, who is an expert on pastoral questions, and Enrico Frigerio, vicar general of the Congregation. It was also a great occasion for getting to know one another. It was also the first time for these "sister" parishes to meet. After the last assemblies for the centenary of the Province of Italy (2004) and of the former members of the Region of Albavilla (2005) it was another chance for progressing with the idea of a movement for lay Betharramites.

The following suggestions were the results of these two days:

1) Form potential pastoral teams or have a twinning system of Betharramite parishes.

2) Build up a Betharramite prayer- movement, a sort of invisible monastery bringing together in contemplation and intention, the ressources of so many friends of Betharram prevented from taking part in the activities for different reasons (age, health, distance).

3) Organise, next year between the 24th April and the 1st May a pilgrimage to Lourdes and Betharram of lay Betharramites from all the parishes of the Italian province.

Lourdes 2007: un unusual assembly

From the 19th to the 21st October 6 laymen and women and 3 religious representing Betharram were present at this important Church event. One of them is going to tell us about it.

In all we were 1500- religious, male and female, and above all lay delegates representing the 35 000 laymen and women who, since 1976 – that is about 10 years after the Council Vatican II – have wanted to "*drink at the common source*" of about 100 religious congregations! The Conference of Major Religious Superiors of France had the initiative, for the first time in the history of the Church, of assembling, together with their religious guides, lay delegates whose wish it is to have spiritual links with a religious family.

From the very beginning of religious orders there were laymen and women who wanted to share in the spirituality of a religious family; they were known by different names – "third orders" and "oblates" with the Benedictines, "Community of Christian Life" practising Ignatian Spirituality, or the "Me Voici Fraternity" for the followers of Betharram spirituality. Lourdes provided an opportunity for these groups of laity with their guides to compare experiences; on the one hand what the laity obtained by adopting the charism of a Founder – a charism is given not only for the Congregation, but also for the Church – and on the other hand what do the religious obtain for their life as they accept what the Spirit is sowing in the laity allowing them (the religious) to deepen their charism and put it to greater use. That is precisely what Pope John Paul II wrote in *Vita Consecrata*.

This first assembly wasn't intended to find out how many we were, but to think over the different routes and manners of groupings between the laity and religious, according to the charism of each religious family, and to deepen the theological stakes of this new form of life in the Church. The title which was posted at the door of the Church of St Bernadette said it loud and clear: *Spiritual Families: a new aspect of the Church?*

A laywoman, Marie-Jo Thiel, doctor and theologian, encouraged us by the theme of her conference: "Behold, I stand at the gate and knock" Charism can enrich the baptismal vocation of the laity, just as the laity can enrich religious life on condition that the laity are not being "clericalised" nor the religious "laicised". Each one is to be faithful to the gift of the Spirit according to his vocation. There was also a round table handled with competence by Father Michel Kubler, editor in chief of La Croix Cardinal Jean-Pierre Ricard, archbishop of Bordeaux, was invited to speak as were Sr Marie-Helene Martin, and Mr Nicolas Joanne. There were lots of hymns directed by Laurent Grzybowski, beautiful celebrations, exchange of news and views. In a word, from Friday evening until Sunday lunch time nobody had time to be bored.

Finally Lourdes looked radiant in the sun and the splendid autumn colours; reflecting as in a stained glass window the different gifts of the Spirit. Henri Lamasse,SCJ
