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Simaluguri a Land of Hope

Simaluguri is situated in the Nagoan district of Assam a vast and fertile landscape for agriculture and with beautiful tea estates where they produce some of the best tea in the world. This place includes various indigenous and ethnic groups like Garos, Bodos, Tivas, Karbis, Adivasis, Assamese, Bengalis and also a good number of migrants the border who came across from Bangladesh. Traditional ways of agriculture and cattle rearing are the main occupation of the people and several people work in tea gardens too. For generations people in Fr. Pascal Sci, Br. Joseph Scj on a pastoral visit these areas did not have much opportunity



to acquire proper education; therefore, they are very keen to educate their children. But unfortunately, there aren't many schools in the villages, so the children have to go to faraway schools many miles away. As a result, some parents hesitate to send their children to distant schools.

So, to answer this need the thrust of our mission in this area is to provide a quality education for these tribal children. Recently under the leadership of Fr. Pascal we started a new school in this village of Pramila with a temporary bamboo structure. Soon we will add other more permanent school buildings with necessary equipment to ensure a good standard of

education. We also need to look to their social and economic development by introducing them to modern and scientific agricultural methods and give skill training to the unemployed youths, so that their family will be economically stable and self-sufficient, an important aspect of development. To reach these goals, we rely on the work of our Betharram religious, their many devoted local collaborators and also the generous support of the good people who support our mission financially.

A panorama of the South Indian Mission

By comparison with North India, South India is more Christian-friendly



region where a good percentage of the population are Christians. In a state like Kerala, Christians comprise 34% of the state population, and Christianity was there well before the advent of European Missionaries. Their Christian tradition goes back to St. Thomas the Apostle who came to this region in AD 52. Christian Missionaries have played a significant role, not only in faith aspects, but also in the socio-economic development of the region. But in the state of Karnataka north of Kerala the picture is very different......

'Dare to go, where no one else will dare to go'... St. Michael Garicoits

As early as 1982, Mangalore diocese with a great missionary spirit adopted Bidar, the northernmost district of Karnataka for evangelisation. This mission venture was popularly known as Bidar Mission. Until then, Bidar district was a part of Hyderabad archdiocese and the entire district did not have any trace of catholic presence before. Under the able leadership of Bishop Robert Miranda, today we have 6425 practicing Catholics. As it is

devoid of industry, it also figures among the most backward regions in the country.

At the invitation of Bishop Robert Miranda, Betharramites began a new mission in Talamadgi. They nurture and sustain the faith of the people who have only recently embraced the Gospel. They educate them for social development and motivate the young generation in nation building.



Inspired by the example of both St Michael Garicoits and Don Bosco, Fr. Sathish Paul Scj and his team reach out to the children and young people of the village, empowering them in various aspects of their life using the language of the young people. As pastors, they look after faith formation and animate BCC (Basic Christian Community) prayer groups are the major task of the missionaries.

A Home to Learning, loving and caring: Xavier Care Home

This mission of Betharram in India has started in May 2013 with the blessing of Archbishop Emeritus Ignatius Pinto. It is a humble beginning of Betharrmites in India aiming to uplifting the Poor and underprivileged children of the aria. "Xavier Care Home" is a Home for the children of single parents, alcoholic parents and orphans. At

present there are 20 children from 5 to 13 years of age. We offer these children necessary facilities, so they can receive integral care and formation like other children in society and so become a blessing to the society. We collaborate with two nearby schools, where our children receive their

education. primary We confident that this ministry will be shared and supported by people of good will, who share compassion and concern for the unprivileged children of the society. Poverty and lack of parental care are the disadvantages the children suffer. Otherwise. intellectually emotionally they are no means



least among their peers in the society. So we invite those who share our vision to share what they have with these children.

Snippets from Holy Land

As part of Betharram's commitment to the building up the Local Church, Fr. Jose Kumar Scj has been assigned to work with Hebrew Speaking Catholics in Israel. This community consists of a small number of Jewish Catholics and a large number of Catholic migrants from countries like Philippines, India and Sri Lanka, as well as a few African nationals. These migrants live in a Jewish and Hebrew milieu and the Local Church (predominantly Arabic speaking) struggles to welcome them (for historic and cultural reasons). Fr. Jose Kumar Scj works as the director of the Centre

where we take care of migrants' children

Our First task is to provide Day Care for babies whose parents (mostly single parents) have to go to work leaving their babies at home or elsewhere. We offer a quality day-care for these babies who are from three months to three years old. Secondly, we organize an After-school programme for school children. The children return from school by noon even though their parents have to work till evening. We invite these children to our centre



where they have their meal, finish their studies and homework as well as spend time in sports and games. If we simply left these children alone, they would be roaming the streets and vulnerable to all sorts of exploitation.

Thirdly, we also provide a boarding facility for a few children whose parents cannot care for them. We offer a very homely atmosphere to these children in a house where a devoted man and woman acts as guardians. Pastoral care is an important dimension of our mission. At the weekend, Fr. Jose Kumar gives catechesis to Hebrew-speaking children and offers pastoral care to various Christian communities. All these are possible because of good will of many people who generously contribute to this noble work. We pray, that God will bless you for your prayers and support.

Down memory lane...along the silk road...

With the arrival of communism in China and the expulsion of Christian missionaries, some of the Betharramites found refuge in Thailand, hoping to go back to China as soon as possible. But at the end of 1951 Mgr. Louis Chorin, Bishop



of Bangkok assigned Chiang Mai as their habitat, asking them to learn the language and study the local culture.

Working with M.E.P¹.they helped building up the local Church among the Northern Thai people in Chiang Mai, Viang Pa Pao, Muang Phan and Lampang.

in 1952-53 others joined the first group. As they came to know of Karen and Lahoo peoples in the hills South-West of Chiang Mai, (similar to the Katchin they knew

in China), they started to make contact with them and learn their language.

Betharram mission soon received Vatican recognition and the M.E.P. returned to Bangkok. The priests soon opened new posts: Chomthong, Maepon, Maesariang, Maetho, Maechem from where they could radiate to the Karen and Lahoo villages up in the mountains. Later they came to know the Akha in Chiang Rai province who came from Burma. Conditions made ordinary community life impossible, but the missionaries followed the advice of Fr. Joseph Mirande Superior General and gathered in Chiang Mai every 2 months to spend time together, praying, relaxing & sharing.

The 30th Anniversary of Ban Betharram-Sampran shows us how 'God can write straight with crooked lines'. After 30 years of working selflessly to build up the local Church, Betharram decided to admit some young Thai people who had been knocking on our door, as aspirants to our Congregation. But the missionaries greatly experienced in tramping mountain jungles, struggled to adapt to this specialised work of formation. So, God gave us Fr. Terence O'Malley Scj from County Mayo as the 'anchorman' for this ministry for 14 years. Fr. Terence scarcely spoke a word of Thai but his love for the people transcended language barriers. God had his own way for Betharram in this 'land of smiles'.

A new Springtime in Vietnam



Vietnam is a most enchanting country in north-east Asia. North Vietnam has been ruled by communist governments since 1947; the South since 1975, so religious freedom is limited though the south is more relaxed. In both there is a vibrant and growing and catholic community, and as a result, as a result, an increasing number of

vocations to priesthood and religious life.

In 2011 the XXVIth General Chapter decided to research the possibility of a new mission in Vietnam, after Vietnamese Christians had made overtures to Fr. Jean-Luc. The visit bore fruit, and soon afterwards 2 young men joined Betharram. In 2015 the Congregation send 2 young missionaries Fr. Yesudas kuttappassery Scj from India and Fr. Alberto Saat Scj from Thailand to Ho Chi Minh city. For foreign missionaries, it is not easy, as in Vietnam they have to be *semi-incognito*, forbidden to openly practice any ministry because of the political restrictions on foreign religions.

As pioneers, they are helping 6 young men who aspirants for Betharram, the first stage of discernment for the religious life. The two young men already mentioned joined our community and are doing their philosophy studies in Thailand, while another two more are in India for their Novitiate. God's mysterious ways are visible through these young men.

A Missionary who discovered Betharram.

I am Br. Iran Lima da Silva. I was born on 22nd February 1981 in Pombal -Brazil. I spent my childhood in the countryside in a place called "Mont Joyeux". Born and educated in a very humble family, I learned the simple characteristic of the inland populations.... Yes, I am a child of the interior countryside of Brazil. It was in this place, in this family, in this



environment that I took my first steps in faith. And it was here that at the age of seven a vocation was awakened in me.

I knew the Congregation at the age of 20, thanks to Fr. Jair Pereira, who was originally from the same region. It was through him I learned to know the Betharramite charism. Deeply touched and attracted by the charism, I decided

to deepen it. Indeed, I was fascinated by the simplicity, the availability and the life of Saint Michael, because it connected with my own roots; I identified with him, his story, his way of being. From that moment on, I never ceased to cultivate the desire to be an apostle of the Sacred Heart in the family of Betharram. Everything I have experienced as part of my initial formation has been important especially the time of the novitiate.

At this stage I drunk from the living source and the richness of our spirituality. In the Spiritual Exercises, I experienced in depth the presence of God in my history, which helped to confirm all that I had experienced so far, as well as the call to be a definitive member of the Betharram family, through religious profession.

As a consecrated person, with the help of the grace of God and the accompaniment of my brothers, I wish to serve people and be a good Betharramite... I am on the road, in discernment, in the learning phase, which includes falls and restarts ... allowing me to be formed; I let myself be moulded in the hands of God so that my devoted service to the Church and the Congregation may be the work of God and for God.
